#### A Word from the Sweet Dreams Quilt Studio legal department about copyrighted materials:

A team name, slogan, font, phrase, or image can all be off limits in terms of Kim being able to make a quilting pattern out of it for sale....if it has been copyrighted or trademarked.

We can say, "Go Tigers" or "Go Mustangs" in a pattern, but we can't say, "Go Atlanta Braves" or "Go Kansas City Royals". We can do things that are Public Domain, but anything else is illegal. In fact, a closer look at some patterns already created resulted in a few patterns being eliminated from the patterns for sale.

We have printed out the 894 page Collegiate Licensing Application form to see about getting a license to legally design team names, but it's going to be a long, expensive process and ultimately, may not come to fruition. You'll be the first to know if/when we succeed!

So, meanwhile, please don't be offended if we respond to a pattern request with "that's copyright protected."

The Ruby King contains 93 patterns, including 22 panos, a retail value of \$1040.00!!!






Enjoy the patterns, use them well, and don't for get to send us photos of your quilting triumphs!








## Becky's Blocks Layout




French Curve 001 Alternating

It took us awhile to get it done, but you can now keep up with new patterns, Crown Jewels Club release dates, photos from our customers....

We'll be using it to make announcements to our longarm quilting customers and share ideas and kudos among us all!

Kim used some of the RAW EDGE APPLIQUE patterns to embellish the flowered alternate blocks in this baby quilt, and in the border. The finished quilt is very impressive, and looks much more complicated that it really is. (but your quilt customers don't need to know how easy the raw edge appliqué is to use.)















Sweet Dreams Quilt Studio has made some pattern distribution changes lately, which only affect Statler Stitcher users. Beginning October 1st, no Pattern Bundles or Crown Jewels Club archives will be available for automatic download. Instead, those purchases will be emailed to you just as soon as we can get to them. The auto encryption system "iStatler" (developed by, owned by, and maintained by Gammill) was experiencing volume difficulties. Their solution was so costly that it was a convenience that we could no longer provide for Bundles and Archives without passing that cost along to our customers and we simply were not willing to do that. So regular pattern orders will continue to be available for auto download....you'll just have to wait a bit for the rest.

We do encourage all of you (not just Statler users) to join our Facebook group and watch for announcements about the Crown Jewels Club. You can also upload and display your quilting photos! Even photos of your quilt studios! We love to see it all!

#### **Email Spam Tip:**

If you are using an email program such as Outlook Express, Microsoft Outlook, etc. to manage your email, you already know about the "junk" folder that shows up listed under your Inbox. But did you know that your Internet Service Provider also has another spam/junk folder which collects emails before they ever reach your Outlook Express or MS Outlook? How do you find it? Go to the web page of your ISP (for example, my personal email account is with CenturyLink) So, I go to www.centurylink.com, and click on the "web mail" link. I have to enter my user name and password, but then I can see my emails even if I'm not using my own computer. I can also see that ISP provided spam box. Take a look through that spam/junk box and see if it has any of your missing emails in it. If it does, you should be able to mark those emails as "not junk". That will help future emails from those senders actually make it to your computer. I can do the same thing for my AOL email account....just go to the www.aol.com, log into web mail, and check out the junk/spam folders. It will surprise you what's in there!
